



Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of Manningham Centre Association was held on 20th November 2013 in the Plaza area of Cassia House. David Meiklejohn, Chairman, presented the annual report of the Board and commented on a number of important issues. He welcomed Councillor Jennifer Yang and Sheena Kay to the Board. He acknowledged and paid tribute to three Directors who retired or resigned during the past year being Stephen Mayne, David Alcock and Terry Maher. He mentioned that the Board is undertaking an important task in preparing a Business Plan as required by MCA's Services Agreement with Council. This is a ten-year plan and will cover MCA's future operations as well as some aspirational plans regarding expansion and growth. MCA's relationship with senior Council officers and the Councillors is sound and Board representatives meet regularly as a liaison committee to discuss matters of mutual interest. He thanked Joe Carbone and his senior staff for their support.

David also thanked the board members for their support over the past year and congratulated and thanked Ross Dawson and his leadership team on the excellent

job they do in running MCA. He also paid tribute to all of our volunteers who do an outstanding job for MCA.

As MCA's treasurer resigned from the Board earlier in the year, David has acted in this position over recent months and advised that MCA is in a sound financial position. MCA had a solid result of a surplus approaching \$800,000, which was up on the previous year. The positive result was driven by a good increase in income of nearly 9% with a very welcome increase in government funding. On the recommendation of the Board, members re-elected Saward Dawson as the auditor for the 2013/14 year.

During the past year, MCA operated with a Board of up to eleven people, which comprised 10 Association members and 1 member appointed by Council. Ron Kitchingman, David Meiklejohn and Sheena Kay were re-elected and elected to the Board.

MCA currently has vacancies on the Board for Association representatives and is in the process of considering this matter.

Message from the 'Promotions Committee':-

The Chairman, David Meiklejohn and MCA Board have approved a promotions project, which aims to link the older residents of Manningham with the current resident teenagers.

As Manningham Centre's residents were among the first group to experience the stage now referred to as 'teenager years', it is most appropriate that our current teenagers take a journey back and discover what links the two generations.

Profile of Pauline Martin

– Home Care Manager

I was born in London where I met and married an Australian man, and we came to Australia when our first baby was only 10 weeks old. I have two children, Sarah who is 32 and Aran who is 30.

Most of my years in Australia have been spent in the beautiful North East of Victoria, in the King Valley area and in Wangaratta, where my children grew up in small rural and regional communities. I moved to Melbourne six years ago so am still getting used to being back in a big city once again.

In my early years, I did a wide range of work including working in libraries, in plant nurseries, running a market garden business and working in vineyards.

I returned to study as a mature aged student when Aran started primary school, and initially undertook an Associate Diploma of Social Science (Welfare Studies) at La Trobe in Wodonga. Completing this was a highlight for me as I studied on campus at night for four years, making the 150km round trip from my home to Wodonga twice a week for that time.

I have continued to study since that initial course and have also completed

graduate qualifications in Family Therapy, have a Certificate IV in Training and Assessment, and have just finished a Master of Social Work course.

I have worked in Community Services for over twenty years now, starting in the UK where I worked as a Homeless Family Aide in London and then in Community Service in Australia.

My work in Australia has included working with children who have severe physical and sensory disabilities, and for six years with Family Services where I provided parenting support, and assistance and strategies to help parents understand and manage children who have difficult and challenging behaviours at home and at school. However, the majority of my working life in Community Services has been spent working in Community Case Management programs for aged clients, where I have worked in Case Management, Program Management and Consultant roles, and this is the area of work I love best.

Outside of work, I am busy helping my partner build a sustainable house not far from Ballarat, where I can indulge my love of planting trees and creating gardens. I also love to read, to go



bushwalking and camping and am very interested in learning more about Astronomy. Our family is also blessed with a beautiful black Groodle (Golden Retriever X Poodle) named Lizzie, who refuses to be left out of anything.

This is my second month working with the Manningham Centre and I'd like to say thank you to everyone for being so welcoming, friendly and supportive.

My job is to assist in the transition of the old CACP and EACH program to the new Home Care Packages, incorporating Consumer Directed Care principles and to develop and implement a MCA self-delivery service, which will provide in home supports such as domestic support, personal care and respite care to clients living in the community.
